## ☀County Fair Passes☀

4-H'ers 13 years and up will need a fair pass in order to gain admittance onto the fairgrounds. These 4-H'ers will need to get their passes from the Organizational Advisor. The Henry County Fair officially opens Friday August 13<sup>th</sup>. Gates open each day at 8:00 a.m. Livestock project exhibitors must stop by the Senior Fair Board Office to pick-up a North Gate Pass (one per family) in order to enter this gate to do chores.

### ☀4-H Booth Reminders☀

Don't forget to plan accordingly for your booth displays...

- 1.) No paper or plastic on the ceilings. Points will NOT be taken off for the booth ceilings.
- 2.) Heavy cords must be used to plug in electrical devices.
- 3.) Power strips must be used if there are multiple cords being used.
- 4.) There will be 2 (two) strands of plastic chain placed on the fronts of the booths. This is for safe booth set-up and tear down.

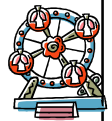

## Clothing Judging

Style Revue at 6:30 pm

Each 4-H member will need to sign-in no later than during the first 10 minutes of the time block your project is scheduled (check judging location). Please put on your garment once you are signed in. You will need to attend the 4-H Style Revue in the evening in order to be considered for Best of Class and Honor Awards as well as for State Fair competition. Photos of award recipients will be taken at the Style Revue.

State Fair selection for 4-H projects is NOT guaranteed to everyone who places "Best of Class" in the county for a specific project. Some projects do not have competition at the state level and therefore none are selected. In other areas, certain projects are combined and we are only allowed to send a specific number of representatives for those projects combined.

## Special Interest Project Judging

Wednesday July 14th 9:00 am - Projects as scheduled

Each member will need to sign in no later than during the first 10 minutes of the time block your project is scheduled (check judging location). Following the judging of each project group, we will attempt to announce and/or post the results and take pictures for Best of Class and Honor Awards. We will be expecting our judges to only judge projects during the assigned times listed. Please be sure to ask if you do not understand any part of the judging process! Written instructions will be posted at the entrance of the building.

## Livestock Skillathon Interview Judging

American Legion Post, 500 Glenwood Avenue, Napoleon

Thursday, July 15th Time as projects scheduled\*

Members involved in interview judging will be those animal projects that are shown during the Henry County Fair. Livestock Interviews are schedule by project areas. The skillathons (or station format) will be used for the following species:

**Beef   Horses   Poultry   Swine   Dairy   Rabbits   Goats   Sheep**

Each member will need to sign-in no later than during the first 10 minutes of the time block your project is scheduled (check judging location). Be sure to fill out your project skillathon score sheet thoroughly before advancing to your project area. If you have more than one project per specie (i.e.: beef breeding and feeder calf), be sure you circle both projects on one skillathon score sheet. Members will then proceed to their specie's skillathon area and will be given further instructions at that point. All livestock project members will need to bring their up-to-date livestock records and completed project book. Be prepared to answer questions!

A skillathon interview judging grade must be recorded prior to the Henry County Fair in order for livestock projects to be considered complete and for the exhibitor to show. The interview judging will be 51% of the 4-H member's final grade, with 49% based on the grade given to the member's animal at the Henry County Fair. Please check the "4-H Family Handbook" for requirements for your animal. An interview grade of A or B is required in order to be eligible for **placing** in the appropriate show.

We will attempt to keep to the printed time schedule as much as possible, but you will need to do the same by arriving during the time your project is assigned. Again, members will need to sign-in no later than during the first 10 minutes of the time block of their project time schedule. If for some reason we run behind, we hope that you will be understanding and patient. It is very difficult to keep all judges on the same pace for over 1000+ projects...thanks in advance for your cooperation! Please feel free to give me a call at the Extension Office with your questions!

4-H Project Judging, simply, is what you and your parents make it. I do my best to provide the most positive experiences I can with everyone I involve. From the judges, to the volunteers, I have the 4-H members best at heart. I was a 4-H member also and I have tried over the years to keep my own positive (and not so pleasant) 4-H experiences in mind during the planning and follow-up stages of 4-H project judging. As a 10 year 4-H member I can honestly say it wasn't the top honors (or lack of) that was a main focus for me in my 4-H project work. I believe that my experiences were positive ones because my parents and advisors encouraged me to always do my personal best and that at the end of the day/year what I learned along the way was the most important. Perhaps my spirit of competitiveness is not quite the same as yours, but I can tell you that in all that I try to accomplish and do for others, I try to do so with my personal best to this day. Competition can play a positive role in a child's development...it can provide a drive that might not otherwise be brought out, blossomed or developed; it can help in self-worth and self-pride development; and it can be plain and simple... FUN! During the months of July and August, parents and advisors are assisting youth in completing their projects, preparing for judging and for exhibiting at the fair. It is important to hold value in the fact that the 4-H Program is one in which all individuals are "winners"...4-H is a learning- by-doing program that makes all 4-H members winners in life. Enjoy all that there is offered in the 4-H Program!

Interview judging is an educational experience that can offer personal communication skill development, personal satisfaction and pride. It can build self-confidence in a way simply reading a project book cannot. As members finish their project work and prepare for judging, the following tips may be useful:

- 1} Be well groomed for judging. That includes your hands, hair and fingernails. \* **Appropriate attire for Special Interest Project Judging, Food & Nutrition Project Judging and Clothing Project Judging consists of Capri/Bermuda shorts or slacks; a collared shirt or tasteful t-shirts (please do not wear cammies, "wife beater" t-shirts or clothing such as these), tennis shoes or casual shoes. Interviews in 4-H help to prepare young people now for their interviews later in life! Livestock Skillathon interview attire consists of the proper show attire worn in the show ring (please see the Livestock Project Member information sent out separately from this newsletter).**
- 2} Use good posture. Sit and stand straight and tall.
- 3} Be prepared to talk about your project. Know what you liked best about your project and perhaps might do differently the next time.
- 4} When answering the judges questions, speak clearly and loudly enough for the judge to hear you. Don't chew gum.
- 5} During your interview/s, look directly at the judge. Give him/her your full attention. Don't be distracted by other people or noises around you.
- 6} Thank the judge when the interview is finished. Remember, the real purpose of judging is sharing and learning.
- 7} Be pleasant and confident. Smile and be enthusiastic.
- 8} Be proud of your accomplishments. You have worked hard and deserve them!

### **What Can Parents Do To Help???**

- 1} See that your child's project is completed...this does not mean that you complete it for them!
- 2} Be "in-the-know" about judging/s. If you are in doubt about something contact your child's club advisor or me (592-0806).
- 3} Be an example! Help your 4-H'er be a good sport and appreciate the success of others.
- 4} Encourage your 4-H'er when he/she succeeds and even more when they fail. Help him/her see progress not just the end result.
- 5} Offer your services to assist the 4-H advisor with knowledge and skills you possess. We can all help 4-H youth by

focusing on the “process” and not necessarily the “product” of the project area. Competition can be a strong thing in a child’s life especially if it’s an adult’s dream and not the child’s. I encourage and challenge each one of you, as I am myself, to temper some of the competitiveness that sometimes turns a positive experience into a negative one. Let’s all help to make the best better by simply encouraging and supporting our 4-H’ers in a non-stressful way!

## Henry County Fair Notes

History in Henry County implies for many folks to this day, that the Junior Fair is a 4-H Fair. We, myself and the Junior Fair Board Advisors, have continued to educate folks that 4-H and Junior Fair are NOT the same program! 4-H guidelines are established by the State 4-H Office, the Henry County 4-H Advisory Council and the Extension staff. Henry County Fair, which includes Junior Fair, guidelines are set forth by the Ohio State Fair, Ohio Department of Agriculture, the Henry County Senior Fair Board, the Junior Fair Livestock Sale Committee and the Henry County Junior Fair Board.

4-H members are eligible to participate in the Junior Fair portion of the Henry County Fair along with FFA, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Farmer’s Union and Farm Bureau youth. Each organization within has its own project guidelines for completion of a project. The OSU Extension-Henry County Office is responsible for 4-H entries for Junior Fair. Our office houses the Junior Fair Board and thus, some people still experience some confusion. If you have any questions, comments, suggestions or concerns about Junior Fair the advisors of the 4-H clubs as well as youth members will take such communication to the Junior Fair Board and its advisors or Senior Fair Board. It is important for you to note Extension/4-H does not run nor make decisions for Junior Fair. As Program Coordinator, 4-H Youth Development, I play an advisory role with the board and still have responsibilities for Junior Fair activities. Each department is responsible for the organization of their departments. Below you will find the name of each department and the adult who is responsible for the departments. 4-H and Junior Fair have an excellent working, cooperative relationship and we have made some exciting progress through this relationship. I am very proud of this relationship and hope that it continues to grow.

4-H focuses on the learning experience opportunity its project enrollment can lend itself to. Members are encouraged to, but are not required to show at the fair in order to complete their project. If a 4-H member with an animal will not be showing at the Henry County Fair **for any reason**, they can and should still complete their project if they attend their Livestock Interview Judging and contact the Extension Office prior to the Henry County Fair to complete an evaluation. Not exhibiting at the county fair means simply that the 4-H’ers will not receive a premium. Premiums are paid by the Henry County Senior Fair Board for exhibiting at the fair. Again, 4-H’ers are encouraged to show/exhibit at the fair, but are not required to in order to complete their project. I hope that this will help in clarifying any confusion.

## What To Wear For Livestock Skillathon Judging...

“Proper Junior Fair Show attire must be worn for Livestock Skillathon Judging. This includes...”

\*Beef “Black or blue jeans/slacks. Shorts and bibs are prohibited. White collared shirt without lettering or farm name. Hard soled shoes or boots. Tennis shoes and sandals are prohibited.”

\*Dairy “White jeans/slacks. Shorts and bibs are prohibited. White collared shirt without lettering or farm name. Hard soled shoes or boots. Tennis shoes and sandals are prohibited.”

\*Goats DAIRY GOAT- “White pants/jeans/slacks. Shorts and bibs are prohibited. White collared shirt without lettering or farm name. Hard soled shoes or boots. Tennis shoes and sandals are prohibited.”

ALL OTHER GOAT PROJECTS- “Dark pants/jeans/slacks. Shorts and bibs are prohibited. White collared shirt without lettering or farm name. Hard soled shoes or boots. Tennis shoes and sandals are prohibited.”

\*Sheep “Black or blue jeans/slacks. Shorts and bibs are prohibited. White collared shirt without lettering or farm name. Hard soled shoes or boots. Tennis shoes and sandals are prohibited.”

\*Swine “Black or blue jeans/slacks. Shorts and bibs are prohibited. White collared shirt without lettering or farm name. Hard soled shoes or boots. Tennis shoes and sandals are prohibited.”

\*Poultry “Black or blue jeans/slacks. Shorts and bibs are prohibited. White collared shirt without lettering or farm name. Hard soled shoes or boots. Tennis shoes and sandals are prohibited.”

\*Rabbits “Black or blue jeans/slacks. Shorts and bibs are prohibited. White long sleeved collared shirt without lettering or farm name. Hard soled shoes or boots. Tennis shoes and sandals are prohibited.”

\*Horses “Show attire is required and should be of show type (English, Western– Equitation/ Horsemanship or Pleasure). No chaps or spurs.” For Western: \*Long sleeved, collared shirt, a belt with buckle, long pants/jeans/slacks, boots and hat. For English: \*Breeches, jodhpurs with boots, coat and helmet.

Market Lambs, Market Hogs, Market Goats will all be weighed as you take your animal/s off your trailer upon arriving at the Henry County Fair.

If you are selling a market animal as part of the Henry County Junior Fair Livestock Sale....

Business cards will be available at the Livestock Skillathon Judging on July 15th. You may use these cards to “market” your animal to potential buyers. Simply fill in your own personal information!
