Tidbits from Teresa

"Every gardener knows that under the cloak of Winter lies a MIRACLE." Luther Burbank
February is the month most gardeners get really itchy for gardening to commence. The Old Farmer's
Almanac had an interesting perspective on this month. When Valentine's Day became popular in the
Middle Ages, the climate was warmer than now. Flowers and love bloomed! Identifying weather patterns
is somewhat controversial, but 1000 years ago Europe was very warm compared to todays' February
temps.

The Medieval Warm Period (MWP), which coincided with the Middle Ages, lasted from 950 to 1250. These warm conditions prevailed from Greenland through Europe and parts of Asia. The possible causes of this MWP are increased solar activity, and changes to ocean circulation. This warm period was followed by a decline in temperature levels. This was called "The Little Ice Age" because it was the coldest phase since the last ice age occurred. Made me think of the January freeze!

Technically, solar winter ends on February 5. This is the darkest quarter of the year with the least amount of daylight for the Northern Hemisphere. It lasts from November 5 to February. After the solar winter, the

Northern Hemisphere enters the time of year when the sun's rays are getting stronger. Until April, day length across the Northern Hemisphere will grow at its quickest rate. However, with both our air and ocean temperatures, there is a phenomenon called 'seasonal lag'. The warmth from the summer and fall months carries into the first part of winter, just like the cold from winter will carry into the first part of spring. Once we move into March I am mentally in Spring mode and looking for any signs that it is coming soon. Our March seminar is always a bright spot in the season and encourages me that Spring is on its way. I am looking forward to seeing many of you there. Gardeners are optimists and know that each season, though different, has its own beauty.

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
February 2024

GREETINGS FROM ARIZONA


