Tidbits from Teresa

Cleaning out my "gardening drawer" I found a few "tidbits" to share with you for February. It's only 48 days until the first day of spring and sunsets are increasingly later in the day. Keep the faith and we will soon be excited about seeing a new season of growth.

Your "PERFECT" garden

Know what you want from a garden:

Style, maintenance level, lifestyle of your family, kind of architecture of your house, budget, winter interest

Specific needs you have:

- Cover eyesore, draw attention to entrance, property value, enjoyment, cut flowers, veggies What are you working with?
- Sun, shade, type of soil, existing plants, drainage, exposure, house views Do consider:
 - Focal points, distance for your views, curves, odd numbers of plants, seasonal appearance, mature size, fit for your conditions

Don't:

Plant too close, expect a perennial bed to be maintenance free, forget to water in new plantings, plant varieties that have "health" issues, skip steps when you start a new bed, volcano mulch around trees.

Do:

Look for annuals for instant color, perennials for the backbone of your garden.

Monochromatic can be beautiful even all green.

Use texture to create interest.

Plan in winter when you can see the "bones" of your garden.

Balance the elements so your eyes flow from one area to another.

Try new plants and design ideas - there are no failures in gardening only learning opportunities.

Be selective about accepting gift plants—you don't want a Trojan horse!

Use ground covers to cut down weed maintenance and a need for mulch.

Be patient and have fun! Perfect is what you like and many times serendipity is "perfect"

Soil "TIDBITS"

1 tsp of soil contains:

- More microbes than there are people in the US
- More species than all the vertebrates on earth
- Several yards of fungal filaments
- Several thousand protozoa
- Several dozen nematodes

CEC measures the soils ability to hold onto and distribute nutrients in forms plants can use because of their + or - charges. Cations = (+) Ca, Mg, K, NH4, H, Na, anions (-) Cl, No3, SO4, & P2O5. Low CEC (sandy or low in 0.M.) can't hold on to N & P. Clays have high CEC, and are packed so tightly that some nutrients are inaccessible to plants. When you add organic matter this makes nutrients more available. NO3 moves easily through the soil, especially in sandy soil, if not intercepted by plant roots or denitrified (returned to the air) by bacteria. NO3 moves easily, NH4 (ammonium) does not move easily.

Soil organic matter (OM) is water conserving, dead stuff recycling, contains life sustaining organisms and is a carbon storage. Soil pulls CO2 from the atmosphere & sequesters it and turns it into humus. Soil rich in OM (ie carbon) is more fertile, has better texture and is able to buffer pH. Systematic tilling reduces carbon stores by 50–70%.

pH, a measure of acidity or alkalinity, affects what you can grow and how nutrients are utilized by the plant. Iron deficiency almost always occurs when the soil pH is above 7.5. (add aluminum sulfate)

More acidic neutral more alkaline
4 5 6 7 8

Each unit is a factor of 10 to the next one......6 is 10X more acidic than 7, 5 is 100x more acidic, and a pH of 4 is 1000x more acidic. This is why it is so difficult to change your pH....say to grow blueberries on a soil with a pH of 7.3. You need to change the pH for the entire soil profile, not just the top inch or two.

Mexican Petunia....a disappointment.


